ROBERT F. KENNEDY JR. SPEAKS OUT ABOUT VACCINES

n July 31, Robert F. Kennedy Jr. was a keynote speaker at a local event in Gordonville. Although the event attracts mostly those of the Plain community, many from the English community flocked to hear what he had to say. He spoke to a crowd of approximately 1,500, discussing topics of public health, personal freedom and the dangers of vaccines for profit.

Kennedy has been surrounded by controversy for a long time for his views on vaccines and other hot-button issues, but he first made a name for himself as a lawyer who successfully stood up against companies and individuals responsible for polluting water. He furthered that endeavor by cofounding Waterkeeper Alliance, an organization that works to preserve clean water sources and protect water threatened by pollution in the United States and around the world. Now, he is also a best-selling author; a syndicated talk radio host; an attorney who serves as counsel for Morgan & Morgan, a nationwide personal injury practice; and the founder, chairman and chief legal

counsel for Children's Health Defense.

In his speech, Kennedy described how he and the environmentalist group Hudson Riverkeeper helped change the Hudson River from a body of water that was so contaminated that its fish were dying at incredible rates and the ones that were caught were riddled with toxic PCBs and tasted of diesel, to a river that fish could begin thriving in again and that humans could safely use for recreation.

traveling North America, suing polluters and giving speeches to help more people understand the problems of contaminated water. In those speeches, he shared information about the dangers of mercury and how coal burning was a chief contributor to mercury levels in fish. Mercury in the blood is neurotoxic to humans, and absorbing a high level of mercury has a host of harmful side effects: it can cause damage to organs, the immune system, the nervous system and the brain. Even low doses of mercury can harm babies by impairing their development and giving them learning disabilities. In the talks he gave, he cited the statistic that one in six women in the U.S. had so much mercury in their systems that any children they bore would lose at least one IQ point.

During his travels, groups of women began repeatedly attending his speeches and approaching him to talk afterwards. "Almost all of them," he said, "were the mothers of intellectually disabled children. And they each believed that their child had been injured by a vaccine, and specifically vaccines containing

mercury." They told him that if he was truly interested in the risk of mercury exposure for children, he needed to look at vaccines. He was disinclined to get involved, however; he wanted to focus on environmental issues. It was only when one of those mothers, a psychologist from Minnesota named Sarah Bridges, came to his home in Massachusetts to speak with him that he took the request seriously. "She had a child who had been perfectly healthy, got a mercury vaccine and became profoundly disabled, had severe autism," he said, and explained that her son is still nonverbal to this day. Although her family had received a \$20 million settlement, Bridges was determined not to allow the same thing to happen to other families.

When Bridges insisted that Kennedy read the 18-inch stack of scientific studies she had brought, he began to read the front-page summaries of each study. He only had to read a few inches into the stack before he "recognized that there was a huge delta between what the public health agencies and the pharmaceutical industry was telling

MANHEIM COMMITTEE IS RAISING FUNDS FOR VETERANS MEMORIAL PLAZA

n the Fourth of July, the Manheim Veterans Memorial Committee began raising money for the construction of a memorial plaza in Manheim Veterans Memorial Park. The park, an easy walk from the Manheim Central High School football field, is a place to reflect on and honor the military service of those from Manheim, Pennsylvania, and the plaza will consolidate the memorials



from throughout the township into one attractive location inside the park. The project was first discussed in 2015 and had been expected to begin fundraising in 2020, but due to COVID-19, the committee decided to hold off for another year. Now, through sponsorships and the sales of commemorative bricks, the fundraising has already brought in approximately 20% of the estimated \$230,000 needed to construct the plaza.

Manheim's military history stretches all the way back to the Revolutionary War, and ever since World War I, the town has provided soldiers to help resolve every major conflictthatthe U.S. has been involved in. Manheim residents have proudly served their country, and some have made the ultimate sacrifice while doing so. Those brave soldiers should

never be forgotten, and during the centennial observance of World War I, the memorial committee began their plans to pay tribute again to Manheim's veterans.

The design for the plaza was created by landscape architect David Christian, whose large portfolio includes designs for other parks in central Pennsylvania, such as Cove Outlook Park in Mount Joy and Snyder Park in Ephrata. With input from the Manheim Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 5956, the Manheim American Legion Post 419, and the Manheim 250 Committee, he designed the gear-shaped plaza with flagpoles for the Air Force, the Army, the Coast Guard, the Marine Corps, the Merchant Marine and the Navy, and currently there is discussion about adding a section for the Space Force to the design. There will be wall seating at each flagpole, and the American flag will fly in a central stage area set off slightly from the rest by fractured concrete that represents the members of our armed forces who were unable to return home. At the center of the plaza will be a gazebo, which will contain the town's eight existing plaques bearing the names of 987 World War II veterans. A seating wall will line the edges of the plaza,

and three textured walkways will connect the plaza to the parking lot and sidewalk on Memorial Drive.

The Manheim 250 Committee promised to donate the remainder of its funds to the project, about \$15,000, and the Manheim Borough Council has promised \$1,500, but the Manheim Veterans Memorial Committee is working to raise the rest that is needed. The committee's chairman, Jim Williams, a retired sergeant major, told The Lancaster Patriot that the committee would like to break ground on Memorial Day 2022 if enough funds can be raised in time.

Anyone who wishes to volunteer to help is welcome. The committee accepts donations of materials or construction equipment, not just monetary donations, or you can buy a brick that will be placed in the plaza around the American flag or along the walkways. The bricks come in two different sizes: a 4-inch-by-8inch brick for \$75, and an 8-inchby-8-inch brick for \$125. Each brick can be inscribed with the name of a person, group, or business, a personal message, or a tribute to honor someone who has served in the military. 



NATIONAL NIGHT OUT IN LANCASTER

very year on the first Tuesday ┥ in August, special events are held by thousands of communities across all 50 states, as well as in U.S. territories and on U.S. military bases worldwide. The goal of National Night Out is for law enforcement and the neighborhoods they serve to get to know each other and make their communities safer. Police departments, neighborhood watch organizations, nonprofits and local companies host various events, including festivals, cookouts and block parties, that feature safety demonstrations, exhibits, visits from emergency personnel and tours of their vehicles, and much more.

National Night Out began officially in 1984, but it had been a work in progress for years before that. In the 1970s, Matt Peskin, a volunteer for a community watch program in a township just outside of Philadelphia, realized that the hundreds of local groups and programs like his needed a way to connect. He established the National Association of Town Watch to bridge the gap and help community watch groups stay informed and remain invested and involved in their communities. The National Association of Town Watch introduced the National Night Out campaign, and in 1984, 2.5 million residents participated in the first events in 400 communities

throughout 23 states.

According to the National Night Out website, this year 38 million neighbors participated across 16,000 communities in all 50 states. In Pennsylvania alone, 181 communities held a National Night Out this year, and 10 of those communities are in Lancaster County.

One event was held on the outskirts of the city of Lancaster, people and several hundred turned out to spend the evening with officers from the Manor Township Police Department, the Millersville Borough Police Department, the Millersville University Police Department, and the West Hempfield Township Police Department, as well as representatives from many fire companies, EMS companies, tow companies and other local agencies. More than 250 vehicles filled the field designated for parking, and

according to the Manor Township Police Department, this year's event drew the largest crowd yet.

The event, held in the parking lot of Leisure Lanes Bowling & Golf Center on Columbia Avenue, gave families the chance to explore more than half a dozen fire trucks, several police and EMS vehicles, and even a SWAT vehicle. Several K-9 officers strolled the grounds to say hello to everyone and let their dogs offer a friendly sniff. The food vendors included Farm Show Milkshakes, Scoops Ice Cream & Grille, Dough Heads Waffles, and Good Guys Chicken & Fries. Even the nutritional pet food company Pet Wants had a booth so visiting pets could have their own snacks. Exhibits were set up from the DUI Council of Lancaster County, the Red Rose Repeater Association, the Community Action Partnership of Lancaster County, the Lancaster County Crisis Intervention Team,

and the Pennsylvania Game Commission. The three-piece band the Kracker Beez performed music for the crowd, giving the event the feel of a festival.

The West Hempfield Township Police Department Chief of Police, Lisa Layden, took part in the event to connect with the public again after so long. After all of the lockdowns and the restrictions on gatherings, the National Night Out was a refreshing change for her. She said the best part of the night for her was the interactions. "Seeing all the little kids come up and say hello, and, you know, get a pin-on badge and a frisbee and stuff — it's really nice."

Patrolman John Reynolds of the Millersville Borough Police Department echoed that sentiment. He has been attending these events for almost thirteen years, as long as he has been serving, and he said his favorite part of the event was "interacting with all the kids here, seeing all the families and all the smiling faces."

The event is definitely geared toward children, and this year it featured games, giveaways and even a magic show. Corn Cob Acres hosted a barrel ride that never saw an end to the line of delighted kids.

The next National Night Out will be held on August 2, 2022, and it promises to be another great evening of fun, learning, and connecting with the community.

BOMBERGER'S STORE HOLDS ANNUAL FUNDRAISER FOR CHILDREN'S CHARITY

n August 5, Bomberger's Store held its sixth annual John Deere Play Day fundraising event. All proceeds went to Children's Miracle Network at Penn State Health Children's Hospital to provide life-saving equipment, patient programs and research to help sick and injured children. The 2021 fundraiser let families support a worthwhile cause while enjoying a variety of fun activities together, including game booths, an inflatable obstacle course, a dunking booth, raffles and an entertaining reptile show featuring Jesse Rothacker of Forgotten Friend Reptile Sanctuary.

The event had tractor displays, face painting and other great attractions, and offered hotdogs as well as ice cream churned on the spot in a John Deere ice cream maker. The suggested entry donation was \$10, and the food and ice cream booths had donation buckets set up. The cost of putting together the Play Day was covered by over 20 sponsors, who gave not only money but also food and the prizes that were given out to children at the game booths.

Esther Hess, the power equipment operations manager at Bomberger's, has been with the company for 22 years and is one of the two people instrumental in launching the John Deere Play Day fundraiser. The idea, she told The Lancaster Patriot,

evolved in 2015 between herself and Amanda Henry-Ruhl (now a former employee), who also worked in the power equipment department. "We wanted to involve our department, include equipment, involve local businesses for sponsorship, and allow community folks to come and enjoy an evening of fun," Hess explained.

This year, Bomberger's gave out over 500 goodie bags to children who attended the event, so Hess estimates that between 800 and 900 people showed up. "It is so much fun seeing the families come," she said when describing the fundraiser, "see them interact with us employees running the stations." She praised the teamwork of the employees who

set up the event, ran it, and cleaned up afterwards. "We have a great team of willing workers and big hearts."

The fundraiser is a perfect fit for Bomberger's. The family-run store has come a long way since 1887, when it opened as a small general store in the village of Elm in Lancaster County. Six generations later, it has expanded into a fullservice business with two locations. Bomberger's has maintained their community-oriented reputation not only in how they run their stores, but also in how they support local causes throughout each year, such as Lititz Springs Park, Lititz Fire Company, Warwick Community Trust Food Bank, Toys for Tots and Water Street Mission. They also give back to the community by donating service hours and material to nonprofits such as COBYS Family Services, Habitat for Humanity and Youth With a Mission. Bomberger's has even been working toward green energy, generating 40% of their electricity through their own solar panels.

Over the years that Bomberger's has been fundraising with the John Deere Play Day, they have enormous contributions to Children's Miracle Network. According to the Bomberger's website, in 2018 their customers helped raise over \$40,000 for the charity. Hess stated in her emails with The Lancaster Patriot that they collect money for Children's Miracle Network through a variety of ways, including bucket sales, the John Deere Play Day, and donations from Bomberger's. So far this year, she said, they have raised over \$4,500 and expect more to keep coming in through donations and shirt sales.


Since sponsors cover the cost of the Play Day, all of the proceeds from the people who attend — the \$10 paid for parking and the additional donations for food, raffle tickets and the prize wheel — go entirely to Children's Miracle Network. That makes the great family fun that the John Deere Play Day provides that much more enjoyable for everyone, and the event will no doubt draw large crowds again next year.

INTERESTED IN SERVING AS A LOCAL POLICE OFFICER?

he Lancaster County Chiefs of Police Association is seeking applicants for those wishing to serve as local law enforcement officers. Anyone seeking to serve with a municipal police department in Lancaster County is invited to take a written and physical exam to apply for consideration.

The next written exam is scheduled for Sept. 11 and 12 in Elizabethtown, PA starting at 8:00a.m. and will cost \$75.00. The deadline to apply is 8/13/2021 at 11:59PM (Eastern) or when the capacity has been met.

Your twelve-month application eligibility period begins on the date you take the written exam. assessment and all PoliceApp processing fees when you submit an application to a participating department.

us about the safety of vaccines and what the actual science was saying."

That launched his long journey into the contentious world of vaccines, one he had not been eager to make. He began by contacting the heads of the health agencies meant to regulate vaccines. He called people like Dr. Anthony Fauci, the director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases; Dr. Francis Collins, the director of the National Institutes of Health; and Dr. Marie McCormick and Kathleen Stratton, both members of the Institute of Medicine's Immunization Safety Review Committee and several other vaccine-related committees. None of the regulators were able to answer his questions satisfactorily, but the one question, he said, that stumped them the most was "How can CDC be telling women, recommending to women, that they not eat fish during pregnancy, because of the mercury in the fish — and yet they're giving them — they're recommending flu shots for those same women that are loaded with hundreds of times of the mercury exposures that they're going to get from the fish?" In the end, they all pointed him to Dr. Paul Offit: a pediatrician; the co-creator of a rotavirus vaccine; an author of books and scientific papers on vaccines; an outspoken vaccine advocate, especially for childhood immunizations — and someone who makes a great deal of profit in the vaccine industry. Kennedy found it odd that the people who were supposed to be regulating vaccines not only couldn't answer his questions but were pointing him to someone in the vaccine industry.

When he contacted Offit, he was told that there were two types of mercury: a good kind and a bad kind. "I've been suing people for mercury for many, many years," Kennedy said. "And I knew there was no good version of mercury. Mercury is a thousand times more neurotoxic than lead. It is the most neurotoxic element that we know of in the universe that is not radioactive." Offit's argument was that the ethylmercury in the vaccines left the body very quickly and did not stay in the body long enough to cause damage, a theory that seemed to be supported by a

study that had been conducted by Dr. Michael Pichichero, a pediatrician and immunologist. The study showed that ethylmercury left the bloodstream of children within a week, far faster than methylmercury had left the bloodstreams of people in previous studies. However, when the study was published in a pediatric paper, Kennedy said, scientists from all over the world wrote in and argued that the mercury must still be in the children's bodies. After that, developmental toxicologist Thomas Burbacher conducted a study funded by grants from the NIH. He divided monkeys into three groups: one group was given oral doses of methylmercury (the kind found in fish), another group was given vaccines with ethylmercury (found in the vaccine preservative thimerosal), and a control group was not exposed to any mercury. The monkeys' blood was tested at regular intervals at the same time for all three groups, and the results correlated with the results seen in similar studies on humans. The monkeys were then sacrificed and autopsies were performed, which revealed that both methylmercury and ethylmercury still remained in their bodies even after the mercury had disappeared from their blood it had just crossed the blood-brain barrier and resided in their brains.

Kennedy challenged Offit on his "good mercury" claim. "And I said, 'And have you read the Burbacher study?' Which was the study that said it's going into the brain. And there was dead silence on the phone. And at that moment, he knew, and I knew, and he knew that I knew that I had caught him in a lie. And he said, 'Well, you're right, um, but it's an entire mosaic of studies.' And I said, 'Can you give me a citation on any of them?' And he said, 'I'll get back to you,' and that's the last conversation I ever had with him. I'm hoping that soon I will be able to talk to him again in a deposition — sworn testimony."

The problem isn't only mercury found in vaccines, Kennedy said. Unfortunately, there are other issues that make many vaccines harmful to the children required to receive them. "What happened to public health in this country?" he asked. "We have now a chronic disease epidemic." After the advent of the 72-dose vaccine schedule, he said, the increase of food

allergies, food disorders, childhood diabetes, developmental disorders, depression, anxiety, and neurological conditions skyrocketed.

He described how the aluminum adjuvants included in vaccines the component designed to make the body's immune system respond to the disease the person is being immunized against — would also cause the person's immune system to become sensitive to whatever was used in the vaccine as a carrier: excipients like peanut proteins, dairy proteins and latex proteins. "We also know that the allergy occurs not just to other ingredients in the vaccine," he said, "but if you get that aluminium adjuvant and there and there's something in the ambient environment at that time, you can now have an allergy to that." He also mentioned a study that had shown that children who got the hepatitis B vaccine had 30 times the rate of allergic rhinitis than children who were unvaccinated. The hepatitis B vaccine had originally been intended for high-risk groups of adults, not as a general vaccine for infants, but it was added to the children's vaccine schedule since, Kennedy claimed, it was not selling well enough to the intended adult market.



RARE GLASS TUMBLER

Tistory repeats itself, and collectors who research Ltheir collections are often surprised by the findings. In 1892, a group of businessmen in Greentown, Indiana, invested in a company that was brought in by the newly found fuel — natural gas — that had been discovered there. Two years later, the Indiana Tumbler and Goblet Company had attracted workers and changed the economy of the small town. The company joined the National Glass Company in 1899, and they made many types of colored glass that are popular but scarce today.

The company was making pressed glass in colors when Jacob Rosenthal arrived in 1900. He was an experienced glass maker. The first new product was chocolate glass, an opaque brown and white

glass that was a huge success. Next was an opaque medium green color called Nile green, then golden agate, rose agate, holly amber, milk glass and Vaseline glass. Unfortunately, in 1903 there was a fire. The entire

factory was destroyed and never rebuilt. But pieces like this Nile green tumbler attract collectors. This 4-inch-high tumbler sold at a Jeffrey Evans auction for \$888.

Q: How do I sell three programs from the 1969 Woodstock festival that are in excellent condition, and what is the range of their value?

A: The program is one of the few official souvenirs of the three-day music festival, which took place in a hayfield 40 miles from Woodstock, New York. No official Woodstock merchandise was sold at the event. The programs didn't arrive until the last day, when there were no vendors to sell them, so they were thrown from the delivery truck, some in the boxes they came in. Not many survived in good condition because of the rain and the mud, or they were discarded and trampled on by the crowd.

The program has been reproduced. The letter "f" in the title "3 days of peace & music" on the cover of the original program is slightly fuzzy because it's in the bud of the sunflower. It's clearer in the reproduction. The first and last pages of the original program

are onionskin parchment. The reproduction pages are not as thin. Original Woodstock programs sell at auctions of rock 'n' roll memorabilia. Value of the right single program in good condition is about \$200.

CAN LYME DISEASE LEAD TO PARKINSON'S

DEAR DR. ROACH: Can Lyme disease send a person into Parkinson's disease? I tested positive for Lyme — I had the bulls-eye rash, fever and terrible headaches. After a month on doxycycline, my left arm started shaking and my neurologist diagnosed me with Parkinson's. The doctor said it had nothing to do with the Lyme disease. What is your opinion? — S.M.

ANSWER: I can absolutely understand why you might suspect

that the neurologist could be wrong. The coincidence seems too much to believe. However, I think your neurologist is probably correct. The different types of neurological complications of Lyme disease are many and varied. The most common are any combination of meningitis (inflammation symptoms the lining of the brain, with headache, fever, stiff neck and light sensitivity); disorders of the cranial nerves (especially the facial nerve, so people with neurological Lyme disease can look like they have Bell's palsy); and damage to peripheral nerves, causing pain and weakness or numbness, often resembling sciatica (but may include other parts of the body).

A detailed neurological exam by a neurologist would look for signs of Parkinson's disease — not just the tremoryou describe, but also muscle rigidity and changes in gait. These would be very unusual in Lyme disease. I did find cases resembling some aspects of Parkinson's disease, but they improved with treatment. It is possible that the stress of the Lyme disease hastened the onset

of Parkinson's disease you were destined to get.

I say your neurologist is "probably correct" because what I found — absence of data to support a correlation — does not mean that there is no correlation, and it is possible that time may prove Lyme disease is connected to Parkinson's. However, I think it's unlikely.

DEAR DR. ROACH: Ever since my mother became ill, my father's health has gone downhill. He has trouble walking and getting up from a sitting position, and he has hardly any feeling in his hands. It has gotten so bad that he has to pick things up with the webbing of his fingers then manipulate it to the correct position.

His doctor claims that this is old age, but I fear it could be a bone issue. A friend of mine many years ago found that she could not raise her arm past her shoulders and subsequently had neck surgery at the age of 80 to correct it. My father is 77 and was fine until recently. Is this really "old age," or could something else be wrong? — J.P. **ANSWER:** It is NOT "old age."

It's a problem with his nervous system, but I can't tell you what exactly without a more comprehensive evaluation. There are several likely possibilities, including carpal tunnel syndrome, but many others as well. He should have an evaluation. A neurologist would be an excellent place to start.

DR. ROACH WRITES: A recent column on itchy ears generated a lot of letters from readers, mostly asking whether this was due to allergies. One person found that it was the dye from shampoo that seemed to cause the symptom. Several people wrote in that treatment with medicated selenium shampoo helped solve their problem.

As always, I appreciate helpful suggestions from readers.



66 afe and effective" is a marketing slogan. It is not science or scientifically proven. Science is a means of improving our knowledge and understanding of the universe based on the collection of observation-based evidence. But what happens when science no longer changes or adjusts to account for actual observations and data? What happens if we are no longer allowed to question the science or examine the data? Consider how far science has come over the past few hundred years alone with this anonymous quote:

"Remember that one time when physicians didn't believe in washing their hands before childbirth and infected & killed their patients, the time they thought it was a good idea to treat hemorrhoids with hot irons or treat mental illness by removing a portion of the brain, when they gave x-rays to pregnant women and disfigured babies

by giving women with morning sickness thalidomide, when they said Karo Syrup and milk powder were superior to breast milk, treated arthritis with arsenic, promoted smoking, infected millions of people with polio (i.e. the Cutter incident), killed a bunch of people with Vioxx, said that probiotics were pure woo, that glyphosate didn't cause cancer, and believed that white sugar was an essential part of a healthy diet? Thank goodness someone thought to question medical 'science' or we would still be bloodletting people with leeches, treating a stutter

by cutting off part of the tongue, spraying kids with DDT, and treating common ailments with poisonous mercury."

These are striking examples in history when science and the medical establishment wrong, to the point of death. It was only 150 years ago when Dr. Ignaz Semmelweis went against the status quo by being the first to endorse hand washing for physicians when he noticed the death rate was nearly five times higher at the clinic staffed by doctors and medical students than at the midwives' clinic. Even after the mortality rate fell from 18% to 2% after implementing handwashing, he was not taken seriously by his senior staff. It wasn't until the mid 1860s and Joseph Lister, that doctor handwashing took effect more consistently and permanently.

Fast forward to the late 1950s and early 1960s where Thalidomide was a widely used drug for the treatment of nausea in pregnant

women. Thalidomide was marketed in 1956 by Chemie Grünenthal in Western Germany, first as an anti-flu, then as a hypnotic drug, and then described as a miracle Thousands of samples were distributed to doctors who were encouraged to prescribe it to pregnant women to alleviate pregnancy nausea. Everyone was told that this drug represented no risk at all for pregnant women, "safe and effective." However, Grünenthal had no reliable evidence to back up the safety reports and ignored the increasing number of reports and complaints about harmful side effects. Because babies were dead before birth, stillborn, or died soon after birth due to the severity of their malformations, it is hard to obtain an accurate number of thalidomide victims. It is estimated that 15,000 children were born worldwide with malformations attributable to thalidomide.

And even more recently, the FDA estimated that Vioxx may have contributed to 27,785 heart attacks and sudden cardiac deaths between 1999 and 2003. Vioxx was a big moneymaker for Merck, generating about \$2.5 billion in

EXERCISE CAN REDUCE RISK OF ALZHEIMER'S

Can we do this? Exercise twice a week for 10 minutes each time to prevent Alzheimer's disease? Of course we can.

the Researchers examined records and followed the progress of 250,000 patients who had mild cognitive impairment. They concluded that moderate physical activity more than once a week reduced the risk of Alzheimer's disease by 18%.

We need to do more for our

brain health than work the daily crossword puzzle or brush up on our chess skills. Physical exercise protects the brain, too, per the study. The key is that it should be moderate to vigorous exercise.

According to the Harvard School of Public Health, examples of moderate exercise include walking 3-4 mph (a brisk walk while you're still able to hold a conversation), vacuuming and washing windows, mowing the lawn and doubles tennis. Other sources are more specific: water aerobics for 30 minutes and raking leaves for 30 minutes.

For comparison, examples of light exercise include washing dishes and using a computer. Vigorous exercises are things like shoveling, singles tennis and playing basketball or soccer.

Having said that, there are more parts of our bodies that need

exercise than just our brains. That's where more time in an activity comes into play. Instead of a mere 10 minutes per day, we're told to shoot for 150 minutes of exercise per week, or 30 minutes onr five days.

One place to start developing an exercise plan is Mayoclinic. org. Type "moderate exercise" in the search box and scroll down the results until you find something interesting. Among the 600 choices are frequency of workout, using weighted hula hoops, Zumba, secrets to a healthy heart and so much more.

The earlier in life we start exercising for our brains and bodies, the longer we'll stay healthy as we

Jason Ortitay ep. (R-Washington/Allegheny) **L U**today expressed bewilderment at a final report issued by Gov. Tom Wolf's Transportation Revenue Options Commission that would cost residents billions of dollars.

"This governor must live in an alternate reality," Ortitay said. "With less than 18 months before he leaves office, he unveils another plan to increase taxes and fees, but this time it won't go into effect until after he is out of office so he doesn't have to experience the fallout. If Gov. Wolf wants to propose billions of dollars in increased taxes and fees, then let's have a conversation about comprehensive tax reform. This plan not only robs the taxpayer but makes fees and taxes much more difficult to understand."

The plan, which never was voted upon by the commission, would establish an 8.1 cents per mile tax for each mile that a vehicle is driven in Pennsylvania; create a pilot mileagebased user fee for electric vehicles; establish a \$1 fee for every package delivered by large corporations like Amazon, UPS and FedEx, as well as deliveries from local groceries and restaurants; charge providers like Uber and Lyft a \$1.11 fee for each trip; create corridor tolling and limitedlane tolling; and increase vehicle registration and vehicle rental fees, along with aircraft registration and jet fuel taxes. None of these ideas can be implemented without legislative action.

66 T fyou can't get the votes ... you can't [legislate] by executive Lorder unless you're a dictator. We're a democracy. We need consensus." -Joe Biden in October

President Joe Biden caved to the radical leftists running the Democrat Party, giving them what amounts to a major political victory this week. Reversing an earlier decision, the president announced Tuesday that he will (unconstitutionally and illegally) extend the home rental eviction moratorium until October 3. Heck, even Biden admitted while extending it that the moratorium is "not likely to pass constitutional muster." It already didn't in court. (More on that below.) Biden has flagrantly violated his constitutional oath.

If anyone was puzzled about who's pulling the strings at the White House, they weren't paying attention.

When the China Virus lockdown began wrecking the economy last year, Congress passed a temporary moratorium on home rental evictions to protect those who had lost their jobs due to the tanking



economy. Which, if you're keeping score, tanked because of the aforementioned lockdown.

The charitable view is that it was a well-intentioned measure to help less fortunate tenants. (Never mind how shredding rental contracts hurt cash-strapped landlords.) Well over a year later, however, it should be obvious to everyone that it was always a power move that amounted to state-sanctioned theft.

Congress's temporary eviction moratorium ended in July 2020, but President Donald Trump called on the Centers for Disease Control to weigh in. Interpreting a broad spectrum of authority not previously thought possible,

the CDC — an agency tasked with studying and containing infectious diseases — issued a temporary moratorium on rental evictions that was renewed three times by both Trump and Biden.



Though Justice Brett Kavanaugh wrote that the CDC had "exceeded its existing statutory authority," he reluctantly let the moratorium stand, because, he said, it would end "in only a few weeks" anyway. But he explicitly stated that after the CDC eviction moratorium ended on July 31, "clear and specific congressional authorization (via new legislation) would be necessary" to renew it.

Well, House Speaker Nancy Pelosi didn't have enough Democrat votes to pass a new moratorium. So she called on the White House to reinstitute the ban through executive action, which Biden initially refused. The CDC was reaching way outside its purview in the first place, and White House lawyers wisely advised the president that neither he nor the CDC had the legal authority to institute a new eviction ban.

The White House first turned to the states, which have been sitting on billions of dollars in aid to help tenants pay their rent — \$25 billion from Trump in December, and another \$21.5 billion from Biden in March. Less than 10% of that money has been distributed. Only 36 of 400 state, county, and municipal recipients report having spent the funds. This should be more than enough to cover the nationwide rental backlog, which Moody's recently estimated at \$27 billion.

Leftists don't give a rat's rear end about constitutionality and Rule of Law. All they crave is absolute power, so the whole argument about legal authority blows like so much wind between their ears.

THE PRESIDENT WHO WASN'T THERE

Teddy Roosevelt fervently believed that the president of the United States should be at the center of the political universe, constantly attracting attention to himself. But he'd never met Joe Biden.

Biden is the most powerful man in the world and yet makes almost no impression.

No one, besides political and professionals, wonders what Biden is going to say about something or considers him a figure of fascination. In fact, he barely rates.

His recent CNN town hall was a fizzle, averaging only 1.5 million viewers. Fox News easily beat it with its regular programming, and MSNBC had more viewers as well, dumping the president of the United States into third place in the cableratings race.

He's underperformed in more formal settings, too. Biden drew 27 million for his first address to a joint session of Congress, whereas Donald Trump drew 48 million.

The contrast with Trump's impossible-to-ignore cocktail of provocation and political melodrama, naturally makes Biden's approach even more stark.

He's the Olympic badminton competition after a WWE match; he's elevator music after a heavy metal concert; he's the sparkler after a fireworks display.

Biden's presidency is, in this sense, practically premodern, almost hearkening back to the pre-massmedia days when presidents were neither seen nor heard.

Of course, this is in part a deliberate choice by the White personal rejections of both men House, playing on the contrast with Trump and limiting Biden's exposure to avoid distractions (and gaffes). Being a notably low-voltage political figure worked for Biden in his comeback primary campaign and in the 2020 general election, so why not as president?

As a result, Biden strangely doesn't feel like the main event of the Biden years.

Assuming it arrives, the midterm backlash in 2022 won't be directly about Biden; instead, it will be driven by the Biden-adjacent issues of the border, crime, critical race theory and — if they reemerge in force – mask mandates and school closures.

Biden is the prime driver of only one of these issues, the crisis at the border that easily could have been avoided by keeping in place the policies the Trump administration had implemented to get control of the flow of migrants.

In other words, the culture war itself is likely to be the overwhelming issue in 2022, rather than the president.

This would be a marked departure from the midterm shellackings that Bill Clinton and Barack Obama got in 1994 and 2010, which were deeply (Clinton was viewed as a draft dodger unworthy of the office and Obama as a crypto-socialist hostile to American exceptionalism).

If no one on the right is enamored of Biden, very little energy is invested in opposing him as such.

Indeed, the idea that tends to generate the most interest and passion isn't that the president is assiduously working to destroy the

American way of life so much as Biden – whose verbal meanderings can be truly bizarre – isn't in charge at all.

Given the alternatives, this probably works in Biden's favor. He is pushing a truly radical spending agenda that would, if championed by a more in-your-face progressive president rather than someone who feels like a caretaker, surely be met with much fiercer resistance.

But there are risks to Biden, too. If his spending agenda founders, it's not clear what comes next. Even if the White House decides to try to "unleash" Biden, he is not well-suited to rallying the country or driving an agenda.

His low-intensity presidency may, as his advisers hope, help create a sense of a return to normality in Washington, but it easily could be consistent with a disturbing sense of drift. Usually, the dynamic of the presidency is if you don't seem to be in control of events, they are in control of you.

The test for Biden will be if, eventually, he has to be the dominant public figure in his own presidency. Rich Lowry is editor of the National Review.

ur impending cultural collision can be seen in what the Navy calls a "steady bearing rate." If you see a ship off your starboard bow at 30 degrees, and then half an hour later, it is bigger, but still at that thirty degrees, that is called a steady bearing rate. If it keeps up, with the other ship always getting bigger and always at 30 degrees, you are eventually going to have yourself an incident at sea.

The grasping overweening overreach of our would-be overlords is exactly like this. Their lusts are increasingly demanding, and every day they get bigger. Almost every day they are always right there, 30 degrees off the starboard bow. And every day they demand that we kowtow to some larger absurdity. If I were still in the Navy, the collision alarm would have already sounded by now, and all the watertight doors would be shut and cinched tight.

In the meantime, an awful lot of Christian leaders who invested heavily in the status quo ante are very interested in this cultural debacle on debut turning out to be nothing at all, nothing to worry about, nothing to concern our widdle heads about. How long will they stick to that story? My current estimate is that they will continue to reassure us that everything is more or less fine and better than Trump until after the 17th Capitol Hill cop has committed suicide, after which point they will write a stiff letter of concern to the appropriate authorities, asking them to look into it.

The Players

There are three main groups that we need to acquaint ourselves with. I am going to draw the circle fairly loosely around all three here, and that means I think there will be actual Christians in all three groups—but in two of them, the Christians will have been compromised in varying degrees.

What are the three groups? There will be the woke, there will be the redstate normals, and there will be the consistent Christians.

Of course there will be Christians in the first two groups, but these will be the Christians who did not heed the apostle John's caution that we should keep ourselves from idols (1 Jn. 5:21 L). In other words, they say they believe in Christ, but their general worldview is still shaped by another religion, and then the appropriate "Christ words" are made to fit into that alien framework somehow. Remember that the reason that John told genuine Christians to keep themselves from idols is because genuine Christians would be tempted not to.

The woke have had their worldview shaped by Marx (with that oppressor/oppressed grid going), they then discover that the word justice is in the Bible, which is about how deep their exegesis goes, and so Christ is glibly placed on the god shelf alongside Che.

The red-state normals think the Christian life means you like to eat elephant ears and corn dogs at the state fair, and you get choked up when Lee Greenwood comes on.

The first group wants to be the storm that knocks the house down. The second group wants the house



to remain standing somehow, but without a foundation (Matt. 7: 26-27 L). What neither side seems to recognize here is that the storm-riders and the "let-us-build-without-a-foundation-because-we-build-for-less" contractors are actually working toward the same end—a collapsed house. One does it intentionally and the other unintentionally, but they are ultimately working in concert.

The third group is made up of Christians who actually mean it. And by "mean it," I am not talking about the sincerity of their belief that Christ will bring them to Heaven. This is larger than personal salvation. I am talking rather about their conviction that Jesus is Lord of all, which means that everything must be subordinated to Him—either brought into His service (2 Cor. 10: 5^L) or cheerfully jettisoned.

This third group, the consistent Christians, know that unless the Lord builds the house they labor in vain who build it (Ps. 127^L). This includes those who would build a nation. If a house cannot withstand a storm without a foundation, how on earth can a nation withstand a storm without a foundation? What is happening to America right now is what happens to houses that are not built on the rock of Christ's words.

It All Begins with the Name

Right now the woke are on offense. They are clearly going for broke in this despotic beta test of theirs. The red state normals are currently playing defense, but getting increasingly exasperated. As I have written on other occasions, there is a blow back in the offing. It remains to be seen how much rough stuff will make up this blow back, but I do think the fact of it is now flatly inevitable.

When that happens, there will be a lot of yelling from the left, and a lot of jeering from the right. As Kurt Schlichter puts it, the progressives are not going to like the new rules that they themselves designed. That outlook is perhaps best represented by the Clint meme above. But . . . and there is a crucial but coming.

As we are considering who should lead us in the future, and who should speak for us in the crises to come (and please note the plural, crises), we should look to those who acquitted themselves well in this one. Now that our governing elites, and our public health professionals, and our media

nabobs, have discredited themselves in just about every way it is possible for them to discredit themselves, here is a simple litmus test for us to use for any up and coming leaders. This should be our bare minimum—and here it is:


We should ask for all pastors to affirm that under no future circumstance will they cancel inperson worship services.

"THE PROBLEM IS US" PART I

hus, the situation today is what it is not because we have social problems, nor because we have evil in our midst. The problem is that the godly are in retreat, retreat from action and therefore godliness. The problem is us.1 ~ R. J. Rushdoony

The Bible makes it very clear that man's problem is that he is a sinner. That message is so clear that the unregenerate attack Christianity as a weapon of control, and false teachers avoid it to focus on a supposedly "positive" message (complete with fake smiles) of a benefits-only pseudo-gospel of joy and blessings from a Sugar Daddy deity of their own imaginations that they blasphemously call "God."

It is also clear that the Bible provides a remedy to our sin in the atonement of Jesus Christ. The first promise of salvation is in Genesis 3:15, just ten verses after Satan's temptation of Eve in 3:5. It is often called the protoevangelium, or the "first gospel." From Genesis 3:15 forward the Bible is the history of God's salvation and thus the predominant theme of Scripture, so the "negativity" of sin is only significant if that overwhelmingly predominant offer and its historical development are ignored.

It is not just false teachers who pervert Scripture. It can and has been done by those within the evangelical camp as well. They reduce the claims of Christ to the "simple gospel" of salvation from hell to eternal life. Too often they ignore the importance of a Christian life between conversion and death.

The Commandments Are Not Grievous

When John wrote (in I John



5:3) that love was keeping God's commandments and that they were not grievous (heavy, or a burden), he was speaking about an aspect of God's provision on how we were to push back sin. The apostle was talking about the way of the redeemed man, the Christian life. The atonement was the means of our justification (declaration of righteousness) in the court of a just God, but obedience to the every Word of God was the way of our sanctification (growth in grace). Too often, obedience is thought of only as the "leading of the Spirit," a vague, subjective standard. It is very easy for men to convince themselves that something is "of the Lord" when it clearly violates His revelation. It is no accident that horrendous evils have been perpetrated by this non-Scriptural but pious-sounding standard. This separation of Christian life and faith was made possible, in part, by a dualistic separation of Christianity from the world into a "spiritual," otherworld plane. That is a very ancient but non-Christian idea. In

the Bible, the "spiritual" represents that which is of the third person of the Trinity, the Holy Spirit, who was given to empower the Kingdom of God. The Spirit of God can never lead contrary to the Word of the Triune God. To understand what is spiritual, therefore, we look to the Word. Francis Schaeffer asked the right question of those who profess Jesus Christ: How should we then live?2 Our answer should be "in terms of the whole counsel of God," or, as our Lord said, "If ye love me, keep my commandments" (John 14:15). John was the same apostle who reminded the church that such obedience was not a burdensome standard in I John 5:3. Our moral individually problems, collectively, come from disobedience to God. Our redemption resolves the curse of death (ultimately in the resurrection) and our obedience hinders the development of the problems of this life caused by violating God's moral absolutes.

Vines, Not Oaks


A recurring image in Scripture is of the grape vine. Israel was said

to be a choice vine that God planted in Canann. The purpose of using a grape vine becomes obvious as this anology is developed in Scripture. A more impressive image for Israel could have been selected, but the vine was chosen because its single utility was that of bearing fruit. Trees like the oak or the cedars of Lebanon had multiple uses. This fact became significant in a parable of Ezekiel 15.

The vine's only purpose was to bear fruit. A vine that no longer bore fruit or that was diseased was removed. Its wood had no commercial value. A small piece of some trees (like oaks), Ezekiel noted, could be made into a dowel and used as a strong pin. A vine had no utility other than producing fruit. Its only usefulness, if we can call it that, was to build a fire. Its consumption in the fire served to prevent the growth of any disease to the new vines that would replace them. The primary purpose of this burning was therefore the destruction of the vine.

Ezekiel does not mention fruitfulness in his parable because he was talking to exiles from Judea during their captivity in Babylon. His audience knew the analogy of a vine referred to the nation (it was already an old usage); the absence of any mention of fruit was obviously because judgment had fallen on the nation as their own status as exiles in Mesopotamia made perfectly

They accused Biden of dragging his feet over what they label a crisis that could put millions of people out on the street. The so-called "Squad" even camped out on the Capitol steps to draw attention to their message. They want the moratorium continued until they are satisfied the economy is stronger. How much stronger, none of the Squad members will say, though their policies will only make it weaker.

In the end, it doesn't

The survival rate of baby sea turtles, for example, has been estimated as low as one in 10,000! Pennsylvania turtles begin hatching from their eggs in late summer, and they have a rough road ahead of them. Our local turtles will likely have a higher survival rate than baby sea turtles, but how much higher? Here's what they're up against:

Mother turtles have one of the toughest jobs in the animal kingdom. Many animals receive help from a mate when it's time to raise offspring, but a mother turtle is on her own. The keystone state is home to fourteen native turtle species, all of which hatch from eggs. Building a turtle's nest is no picnic, compared to building a bird's nest. With Robins, for instance, the male and female both work together to build a nest, long before the eggs arrive. Likewise for many bird species, building a nest is part of the courtship process. It's kind of like how my wife and I bought our first home, six years before we had a baby. We didn't even consider having kids until our "nest" was ours, and ready for little ones.

To understand what it's like to be a mother turtle, try to remember when your own kids were born. When our son Kenny was born eleven years ago, it was one of the least stressful childbirth stories you'll ever hear. We actually stopped for ice cream on the way to the hospital. When we arrived at the hospital, we had our own room and a giant bed, and plenty of doctors and nurses to walk us through the entire process. When we got hungry they brought us meals. When we got thirsty we had drinks. We basically lived like royalty. Obviously my wife did the real work, but it was still a team effort, with a long list of welltrained people helping to bring

our son into the world as safely and as comfortably as possible.

A mama turtle, on the other hand, is the only player on her team. When she needs to lay eggs, there is no bed waiting for her. No nest has been built by her mate. There's definitely no stop for ice cream. In fact, her nest is not built yet, and it's not even above ground! If she's hungry or thirsty, there is no room service. Not only are there no doctors or nurses looking after her, but her mate has also been out of the picture for weeks. While birds lay eggs in their own homes, most turtles actually leave the safety of their homes to nest somewhere much more dangerous. It would be akin to humans leaving the safety of their homes to give birth in a dangerous jungle or a bad part of the city. It's a scary proposition!

13 of Pennsylvania's 14 native turtle species are aquatic or semi aquatic, meaning they spend most or all of their lives in the water. Many of them never leave the safety of the water any other time, except for nesting. A turtle's nest is not built out of sticks and debris like a bird's nest. Actually a turtle's nest is merely a hole in the ground — a hole that must be dug by the mother turtle, moments before she lays her eggs.

Think back to the story of my first child, when I drove my wife to the hospital, and we stopped for ice cream on the way, before checking into a medical resort. If my wife was a turtle, she would have had no one to drive her to the hospital, no stop for ice cream, no bed to give birth in, and no hospital staff to tend to her every need. And to top it all off, she would have had to dig a huge hole in the ground while actively going into labor! Sadly many mother turtles are hit by cars before they even reach their nesting sites, and won't even get the opportunity to dig their nests. The odds are certainly stacked against them!

But even against all odds, many adult turtles manage to locate a nesting spot, dig a hole with their back legs, and deposit all of their eggs underground. Then they will cover up the hole to disguise its location, and disappear back into the wild.

Once turtle eggs are laid, they must survive months below ground without parental protection. Food is hard to come by in the wild, and two months is a long time for unguarded eggs to survive. Food is much easier to come by in the Rothacker house, and yet unguarded Halloween candy rarely lasts two months! If I bring home fresh croissants and set them on the counter, I can guarantee they will be predated by our family of four in less than 24 hours! Underground turtle nests are delicious and nutritious meals for raccoons, skunks, and many other wild animals. The fact that any of these eggs survive is mind-boggling.

Even if the eggs are not eaten by predators, they need to survive many other challenges. My friend Curvin Good, for example, once observed a box turtle laying her eggs underneath his mailboxes in the Cocalico area. The nesting site was covered in loose gravel and sand, materials that offered the turtle an easy digging opportunity. Unfortunately it was also the same spot that cars drive over to pickup or drop-off their mail. Similarly,

turtles commonly choose garden mulch or compost piles as nesting sites, because the loose soil is so much easier for gravid (pregnant) females to dig into, and for baby turtles to climb out of. But if people begin walking on that mulch, or turning that compost, it could spell disaster for the developing embryos

If the baby turtles are lucky enough to hatch, they will need to solve an immediate problem. They have been buried alive! Starting life as a turtle is akin to waking up in an underground casket. They have no idea how they got there, but somehow they figure out which way is up. Their first act as a newly hatched baby is to start digging! If they manage to climb their way to the surface, coated in dirt, their journey has just begun.

When I was a kid, someone told me that children should be seen and not heard. If you're a baby turtle, your survival depends on not being seen or heard! Baby turtles are very close to the bottom of the food chain and they have virtually no defense once they're discovered by predators. They are eaten by birds, fish, mammals, and even other turtles! Every day they stay alive though, their odds of survival increase. As adults, their shells will grow stronger and begin to offer an increased level of protection. But as babies, their shells are so soft they can be squashed like a bug, and eaten by almost everything!

Turtle hatchlings do not nurse their moms like mammals, and are not fed by their parents like birds. Even alligators enjoy the luxury of a protective mom that stands guard, as they learn how to fend for themselves for several months. Baby turtles will never know their parents, and quickly leave their siblings. Yet somehow they know the three rules of baby turtle survival:

1. Hide 2. Eat

3. Repeat

If I listed every obstacle that baby turtles need to overcome, this story could be a whole book. Hopefully this brief article will help you to appreciate our four-legged, shelled friends, and all the work they went through to be here. If you don't ever see a baby turtle, don't take it personally. They need to hide as long as possible if they want to live another day. Many of us will never encounter baby turtles, but may find their hatched eggs in our gardens or compost. It's almost like they're leaving their calling card, to remind us how they can hatch right under our noses, completely undetected.

If you are lucky enough to encounter a baby turtle, please resist the urge to take them home. Their odds of survival are low, so they need as many babies as possible to remain in the wild. It's okay to help them cross the road, but otherwise let them take their chances in the wild. It's nature's way, and it's the way their mom would have wanted

HEATSTROKE ALMOST KILLED HER DOG

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: I never keep my dog "Alfie" in the car, even on cool days. Last Sunday, I took Alfie to the park to get some exercise. It was hot, and after a short while Alfie came back to me, panting heavily. He was still panting on the drive home and seemed lethargic, so I called his veterinarian, who said to take him to the emergency vet immediately. There, he was diagnosed with heatstroke! They treated him and he's doing much better, but I was shocked at how quickly Alfie developed a heat injury from being outside. Please warn your readers that dogs are very vulnerable to summer heat. — Chris in Portland, Oregon

DEAR CHRIS: You are so right! I'm glad Alfie is doing well and that tragedy was averted by your instinct to contact the vet.

Just like humans, dogs need to acclimate to their environment. Sudden weather extremes like excessive heat or freezing cold are very difficult to adjust to. Dogs have far fewer sweat glands than humans; they manage their body temperature in other ways, such as panting when it's hot. So if we're feeling the heat, dogs are feeling it

It's important to watch for signs of heat injury, especially when outdoors. Excessive panting is a key sign, as is lethargy and excessive drooling. Other symptoms include reddened gums, vomiting, diarrhea, loss of coordination and collapse. Immediate treatment is needed to prevent serious injury or death.

Keep plenty of cool water on hand for your dog to drink, both indoors and out. Never leave them in the car, even for a minute. At home, keep the air moving with fans, and cool down the environment with an air conditioner.

JULY JOBS REPORT NOT AS IMPRESSIVE AS HEADLINE SUGGESTS

T.S. nonfarm payrolls added 943,000 jobs in July after a gain of 938,000 in June. The July gain is the seventh in a row and 14th in the last 15 months, bringing the seven-month gain to 4.318 million and the 15-month postplunge recovery to 16.660 million. This is still well below the 22.362 million combined loss from March and April of 2020, leaving nonfarm payrolls 5.702 million below the February 2020 peak (see first chart). If payrolls continue to grow at the average over the last seven months (616,857), it may take another nine months to fully recoup all of the job losses.

However, the headline gain was boosted by a large jump of 230,000 in state payrolls. Private payrolls posted a less impressive though still strong 703,000 jobs gain in July after a 769,000 gain in June. The July rise in private payrolls is also the seventh in a row and 14th in the last 15 months. The July addition brings the seven-month gain to 3.721 million and the 15-month recovery to 16.433 million versus a combined loss of 21.353 million in March and April of 2020, leaving private payrolls 4.92 million below the February 2020 peak (see first chart). If private payrolls continue to grow at the average over the last seven months (531,571), it would also take about nine months to fully recoup all of the job losses.

The breadth of gains was positive again in July. Within the 703,000 gain in private payrolls, private services added 659,000 while goods-producing industries added 44,000. For private service-producing industries, the gains were again led by a surge in leisure and hospitality, adding 380,000, accounting for more than half of the total gain in private payrolls, an 87,000 gain in education and health care services, a 60,000 rise in business and professional services, and 50,000 new jobs in

transportation and warehousing. Retail continued to be somewhat volatile, losing 6,000 jobs in July, the second decline in the last four months (see second chart).

Within the 44,000 gain in goods-producing industries, construction was up 11,000, durable-goods manufacturing increased by 20,000, nondurable-goods manufacturing added 7,000, and mining and logging industries increased by 6,000 (see second chart).

After 15 months of recovery, all the major private industry groups still have fewer employees than before the government lockdowns. Three industries – Leisure and hospitality (down 1.737 million jobs), education and health services (down 953,000), and professional and business services (off 556,000) – are down more than half a million jobs each.

On a percentage basis, the losses are more evenly distributed. Three of the 14 private industries shown in the report have declines of 4 percent or more since February 2020. Leisure and hospitality leads with a 10.3 percent drop since February 2020, mining and logging comes in second with a 7.7 percent loss followed by information services at 5.9 percent. For the labor market as a whole, total nonfarm payrolls and private payrolls are down 3.8 percent since February 2020.

The government sector added 240,000 employees in July, with local government payrolls rising

by 230,000, state government payrolls down 8,000, and the federal government adding 18,000 workers. The surge in local payrolls is related to the seasonal variation for schoolteachers which has been disrupted by the pandemic and is likely not a true reading for trends in local hiring.

Average hourly earnings rose 0.4 percent in July, putting the 12-month gain at 4.7 percent. The average hourly earnings data should be interpreted carefully, as the concentration of job losses and recovery for lower-paying jobs during the pandemic distorts the aggregate number.

The average workweek was unchanged at 34.8 hours in July. Combining payrolls with hourly earnings and hours worked, the index of aggregate weekly payrolls gained 0.9 percent in July. The index is up 10.6 percent from a year ago.

The total number of officially unemployed decreased by 782,000 in July to 8.702 million. The unemployment rate dropped sharply to 5.4 percent while the underemployed rate, referred to as the U-6 rate, fell to 9.2 percent in July. In February 2020, the unemployment rate was 3.5 percent while the underemployment rate was 7.0 percent.

The participation rate increased by 0.1 percentage points in July, coming in at 61.7 percent versus a participation rate of 63.3 percent in February 2020. The employmentto-population ratio, one of AIER's Roughly Coincident indicators, came in at 58.4 for July, up from 58.0 in June but well below the 61.1 percent in February 2020.

The July jobs report posted a very strong headline gain of 943,000 in July. Private payrolls also had a strong gain but not as strong as the total would suggest as seasonal adjustments exaggerated the disrupted seasonal patterns in local education employment. Furthermore, while there were increases in most industries within private payrolls, more than half of the 703,000 gain came from just one industry, leisure and hospitality. Despite the seven consecutive monthly gains and 14 increases in the last 15 months, payroll employment remains well below peak measures from before the pandemic.

Other measures of economic activity generally suggest the economic recovery from government lockdowns in 2020 is continuing as the restrictions on consumers and businesses are lifted. However, the damage done by the lockdowns was severe. The inability of supply to recover as quickly as demand is resulting in shortages in some areas of the economy and putting significant upward pressure on prices. Furthermore, the rising number of new Covid cases from the Delta variant is a growing risk to the recovery. The overall outlook is tilted to the upside, but challenges remain, and risks are growing.

FAIRNESS IN WOMEN'S SPORTS HEARING SHOWS SIGNIFICANT MALE ADVANTAGES IN ATHLETICS NOT ERASED BY HORMONE REGIMES

Today, the House Education Committee convened a hearing on House Bill 972, the Fairness in Women's Sports Act, sponsored by five women members of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives – Reps. Barb Gleim (R-Cumberland), Martina White (R-Philadelphia), Valerie Gaydos (R-Allegheny), Dawn Keefer (York/Cumberland) and Stephanie Borowicz (R-Clinton/Centre).

The first panel included Dr. Gerald Montano, assistant professor of Pediatrics at the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine, and Dr. Gregory Brown, professor of Exercise Science and Phd in Health and Human Performance at the University of Nebraska at Kearney. The second panel was Sophia Tellis, a student athlete from Luzerne County, and Evangelino Nascimento, parent of transgender student athlete. The third panel consisted of Lily Williams, a student athlete from Lancaster County, and Beth Seltzer, founder of Save Women's Sports.

Williams, captain of the Hempfield High School women's cross country track team, raised some important aspects on the inclusion of biologic males on women's sports teams that warrant further consideration:

"We don't have separate teams



for every identity because what we feel about gender isn't relative to sports. We have them because there are two sexes. In fact, advantages like that don't go away even if they were to take female hormones.

"There are many ways to support everyone. The boys on the track team are perfectly capable of accepting a boy who identifies as a girl, or any other gender, on their team as they did the fall of this past year when this individual ran on the boy's team.

"If bullying or any other unkind behavior were to occur, there are ways to deal with that. Hempfield has never accepted behavior like that on any team and if that were to happen those boys should be dealt with.

"But ignoring the girls while

our rights to privacy and fairness in competition are being violated shouldn't be acceptable either."

Dr. Montano said that male adolescents who identify as girls are girls, especially when they receive puberty blockers and cross-sex hormones. Montano urged that decisions to allow male student's who identify as girls on girls' sports teams be made on a case-by-case basis by governing school and sports authorities.

Dr Brown explained that there are biological differences between human males and females, those differences give males an inherent advantage over women, and that those advantages are not erased by gender identification or use of cross sex hormones. He testified that study after scientific study,

including six since 2015, show that despite puberty blockers and hormone therapy, a male will always have physical advantages over comparably aged females.

There were differing views from female athletes as well. Sophia Tellis, a high school student soccer player from Luzerne County, said she has no problem with biological males competing against her on the field. Lily Williams, on the other hand, says that she would welcome all biological girls on the girl's team, and that includes girls who identify as a boy, or any other gender identities like pangender or demigender for that matter.

Gleim has said in the past, "The only people who benefit if HB 972 isn't passed are males. Without HB 972, all girls are harmed, including those who identify differently. Even girls who identify as boys are disadvantaged because the expectation that they should cross over to boy's teams will result in significantly less opportunities for them, too. They won't be able to make most boys teams and even if they do, their playing time and opportunities will be much less than if they continued playing in the girl's division."

"Further discussion of this policy, of which more than 30 states are currently considering, will occur in the Education Committee when we reconvene at the end of September," Gleim said.

PENNDOT SEEKS INPUT THROUGH ANNUAL HIGHWAY SAFETY SURVEY




he Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT) is seeking your input on traffic safety and driving behaviors through its annual online Highway Safety Survey.

GOVERNOR WOLF ANNOUNCES AVAILABILITY OF LOW-INTEREST LOANS FOR SURVIVORS OF DEVASTATING JULY FLOODING

overnor Tom Wolf announced today that the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) approved his request to make financial aid available to residents in Bucks, Philadelphia and Tioga counties after severe storms caused devastating flooding and significant damage on July 12. Residents and businesses in the neighboring counties of Bradford, Delaware, Lehigh, Lycoming, Montgomery, Northampton and Potter can also apply for aid.

"The devastation caused by this flooding will linger in the minds of survivors for years to come," said Gov. Wolf. "But it is our hope that these low-interest loans provide much-needed assistance in helping people get back to normal as quickly as possible."

According to the National Weather Service, the flood-affected areas received anywhere from 6 to 10 or more inches of rain in a three- to four-hour period, damaging homes and destroying personal property and cars. Homeowners, renters and businesses impacted by the flooding in Bradford, Bucks, Delaware, Lehigh, Lycoming, Montgomery, Northampton, Philadelphia, Potter and Tioga counties may be eligible for low-interest disaster loans through the SBA Disaster Loan Programs.



Low-interest loans to \$200,000 are available to homeowners and renters to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate, and SBA regulations also permit loans up to \$40,000 to repair or replace damaged personal property, including vehicles. Businesses and nonprofits can borrow up to \$2 million to restore damaged or destroyed buildings, inventory, equipment and other physical losses. Economic Injury Disaster Loans are also available and may also be used to pay fixed debts, payroll, accounts payable and other bills that can't be paid because of the disaster's impact, whether or not the business sustained physical damage from the storm.

The SBA offers long-term repayment options to keep payments affordable, with terms up to a maximum of 30 years. Terms are determined on a case-by-case basis, based upon each borrower's ability to repay.

The SBA will open Disaster Loan Outreach Centers (DLOCs) in Bucks County and Philadelphia to provide in-person assistance for those Tuesday – Friday, Aug. 3 – Aug. 6: wishing to apply, and anyone from any county included in the disaster declaration can visit any DLOC location. The Tioga County DLOC will be established virtually. However, businesses and individuals may immediately obtain information and loan applications by calling the SBA's Customer Service Center at 1-800-659-2955 (1-800-877-8339 for the deaf and hard-of-hearing), or by emailing DisasterCustomerService@sba.gov.

MVA: IMPORTANT TO SAFEGUARD DD-214 MILITARY PAPERWORK

ne of the most important documents for transitioning servicemembers and veterans is their DD-214. Safeguarding this important military document should be a top priority, the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs said today.

The DD-214 is a document of the United States Department of Defense, issued upon a military servicemember's retirement, separation, or discharge from active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States. It contains information needed to verify military service for benefits, retirement, employment, and membership in veterans' organizations. Without this key document, there could be a big delay when veterans seek benefits earned through their service to our

For veterans who have lost their DD-214, or family members who cannot locate it on a veteran's behalf, the DMVA is always ready to assist in retrieving an official copy.

"We field thousands of requests for information from veterans each year, and the majority of those requests are for help to find their DD-214," said Brig. Gen. (PA) Maureen Weigl, deputy adjutant general for Veterans Affairs. "Helping veterans find their military paperwork is a priority for DMVA and not even the pandemic stopped us from processing the large volume of requests we received this past year."

The DMVA can also assist with locating the DD-215, which is used to correct errors or make additions to a DD-214, helping to assure that veterans have accurate discharge documentation.

Weigl said that the easiest way to manage military documents and avoid having to frantically search for them is to make sure they are filed in a safe place upon leaving the military.

"One of the first stops for a servicemember leaving the military should be the Prothonotary's Office at their county courthouse to file their DD-214/15," said Weigl. "This will allow veterans and their family members to always have access to an official copy of their paperwork and avoid a frustrating search if they

ever lose their original. No matter what, the DMVA is always ready to assist veterans looking for their documents, so they should never hesitate to reach out to us for help."

FAMILY RESEARCH COUNCIL FILES COMMENT REBUKING HHS'S PROPOSED REVERSAL OF THE ABORTION SURCHARGE RULE

amily Research Council submitted a public comment to the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) regarding the proposed rule with the deceptively innocuous title, "Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act; **Updating Payment Parameters and** Improving Health Insurance Markets for 2022 and Beyond." Under the proposed rule, insurers would be able to collect payments for both abortions and legitimate healthcare in a single payment. In Section 1303 of the Affordable Care Act, Congress required insurers to collect "a separate payment" for abortions, a provision which the Obama administration did not enforce. During the Trump administration, HHS complied with the law, requir-



ing transparency and separate payments for abortion.

FRC's comment highlighted four problems with the proposed rule. It violates section 1303 of the Affordable Care Act, which requires separate payments for abortion. diminishes the distinction between health care and abortion by combining the payment. It lacks

transparency, hiding which plans on in 1976. Pro-life Democrats included the marketplace pay for abortions. violates Hyde Amendment principles, funding abortion with taxpayer dollars.

FRC's comment concludes:

"American taxpayers should not have to unknowingly fund abortion, a practice that many find morally objectionable. American sentiment and standing policies make it clear that taxpayer dollars have no place in funding the abortion industry. There must be a clear separation between legitimate health care and elective abortion."

Connor Semelsberger, Director of Federal Affairs for Life and Human Dignity, who authored the comment, added:

"The passage of Obamacare in 2010 was the largest deviation from the bipartisan consensus to not use taxpayer funding for abortion, first established by the Hyde Amendment

CHICAGO FOP PRESIDENT: OFFICERS 'TURNED THEIR **BACK TO THE MAYOR - AND RIGHTLY SO'**

hicago police officers turned their backs on Democrat Mayor Lori Lightfoot Saturday evening after two of their fellow officers were shot, one fatally - and Lightfoot deserved it, the president of Chicago's Fraternal Order of Police said Monday.

As ABC 7 Chicago reports, the two officers were taken to the University of Chicago Medical Center, where 10 p.m. to stand guard and pray":

"Three people are in custody after two Chicago police officers were shot Saturday night. One of the officers later died from her injuries.

"A male officer continues fighting for his life Sunday. Sources tell the I-Team that the wounded officer has three gunshot wounds: One exited an eye, one lodged in the back of the head and one struck his shoulder."

Mayor Lightfoot, who has been criticized for her lack of support for

"hundreds of officers gathered after the police, used the officer's death to promote her gun control agenda, The Blaze reported.

"Chicago Mayor Lori Lightfoot used the heartbreaking death of a Chicago police officer to advance her narrative that guns are one of the Windy City's biggest problems."

"We have a common enemy: it's guns & the violence they bring," the mayor tweeted, responding to the news of the shootings. She, later, repeated the claim in a statement.

"For the two-and-half years

that she has been mayor, she has vilified the police," John Catanzara, president of Chicago's Fraternal Order of Police, told Fox News on Monday, noting that Lightfoot ignored being told she was not welcome at the hospital where the officer was in Intensive Care:

"The men and women of this police department have no respect for this mayor, and it was as palpable as you could possibly imagine outside that

countries do them. We should be looking for cost savings, instead of jumping directly toward increasing billions of dollars in taxes and fees."

The report also urges the Legislature to act immediately on this proposal and that PennDOT will be moving to make the recommendations of this report a reality in the next six months.

"If this was such a priority and such an issue, why has the governor never addressed it in any of his budget addresses?" Ortitay questioned. "If the Wolf administration is truly interested in moving forward, we should proceed with my House Resolution 130 to first determine how we can work within our current means before asking taxpayers to foot the bill on another \$10 billion in spending from a lame duck administration."

The plan also proposes to phase out the current Commonwealth gasoline tax.

"The gas tax would not be phased out until after vehicle registration fees are doubled and mileage-based user fees are implemented for a full five years," Ortitay said. "If you think taxes magically disappear after the government says they will, let us not forget the Johnstown Flood Tax or the temporary Personal Income Tax under Gov. Ed Rendell that is still 'temporarily' in place."

Ortitay also expressed concerns about additional tolling, not only under this plan but also under one unveiled in February that would toll nine bridges across the state, including the I-79 bridge near the Bridgeville exit.

"Again, PennDOT is overstepping the law and the authority it has to enter into these contracts, which is just begging for lawsuits with its shady ways of trying to hide its tolling plans," Ortitay said. "It passed a generic resolution last November when the Legislature wasn't in session. There was no list of the bridge projects. Then in February, coincidentally after the Legislature could object, PennDOT announced which bridges were under consideration across the state. Conveniently, the announcement neglected to state that eight of the nine proposed bridges to be tolled are in Republican districts, proving this administration loves to play partisan politics.

"If matters could get any worse, the sole discretion for setting the toll rates will be directly in the hands of the governor. To add icing to the cake, if a certain toll fails to produce enough revenue to cover the financing cost to keep the financing company whole, the shortfall will be taken from the Motor License Fund, which everyone pays into. Either way, whether you travel one of the bridges that will be tolled under the February proposal or not, you will end up paying for it."

The 46th Legislative District includes Collier and South Fayette townships and Bridgeville, Heidelberg, McDonald and Oakdale boroughs in Allegheny County. It

"In 1940, the level of chronic disease in Americans, all generations of Americans, was 6%," he stated, then said that after the vaccine schedule started changing, so did the number of people with chronic disease. "By '86, the level of — of chronic disease had doubled to 11.8%. Today, as of 2006, which is the last time they did the survey, 54% of our children now have a chronic disease." His generation, he said, had never really encountered autism, since it affected around one in every 10,000 people before 1989. Now, it affects one in every 22 boys in the general population. The levels, he said, are continuing to rise.

He pointed out that a startling change can be seen in the pharmaceutical industry as well. "When I was a kid, these companies were making \$187 million a year selling vaccines. Today, they're making \$60 billion. But the big money is not from the vaccines. It's from selling the remedies for the chronic diseases that are coming from the vaccines. So if you look at the top ten blockbuster drugs for any of those companies, those drugs are being sold to treat diseases that are listed on their inserts manufacturers' inserts — as vaccine side effects. And by the way, federal law prohibits them from listing that disease on their insert unless the FDA believes that that disease the science supports the fact that that disease is being caused by their product."

Although the FDA is aware that such adverse effects can result from vaccines, there is a fundamental problem with the whole vaccination industry. "Vaccines are immune they're the only medication that never has to be safety-tested against a placebo," he stated. "And the problem with that is that you're not looking at health outcomes in vaccinated populations versus unvaccinated populations. You're not able to say, 'This vaccine is actually giving us healthier children.' Those kinds of studies are never done. And the one time that they did it, it was a catastrophe. So we've gone out — Children's Health Defense — and we've found 71 studies that compared vaccinated population to unvaccinated population. Among a 100,000 studies on the internet, on the peer-reviewed — on what they call PubMed, which is the archive for every peer-reviewed publication — we've been able to find 71, and we have those all posted on our website. And what you can see in every case, when you compare vaccinated populations to unvaccinated populations, the vaccinated population are by far the sickest. They have diabetes, special education, rheumatoid arthritis, autism, ASE, all kinds of neurological injuries."

He explained that the reason why vaccines did not have to be tested like any other medication is because the government wanted to be able to rush an antidote to its citizens in case of a biological attack, such as anthrax, and long-term safety testing takes years. However, in the 1980s, Kennedy said, so many people were suing pharmaceutical companies because of vaccinerelated injuries that the companies told the government, essentially, "We are losing \$20 in downstream liability for every \$1 that we're making in sales. And we're going to stop making vaccines altogether unless you give us complete immunity from liability." So, in 1986 the Reagan administration and Congress passed the National Childhood Vaccine Injury Act, granting pharmaceutical companies complete immunity from liability. The government assumed the risk instead, which means that no matter how negligent or reckless a vaccine maker is, no matter how toxic an ingredient they use, and no matter how grievous an injury a consumer receives, the company cannot be sued. People can try to recover losses from the federal government, Kennedy explained, but the minority who do manage to win a settlement rarely come away with enough to make the fight worthwhile.

He encouraged his audience to rethink allowing people like Fauci to "convince us that good health only comes in a syringe" and has nothing to do with the way that we care for our bodies and for our environment. He pointed out that people like Fauci have been able to control the narrative for decades, well before the COVID-19 pandemic began. Fauci and the heads of the other agencies of the National Institutes of Health control the flow of billions upon billions of dollars for research, and entire universities are dependent upon NIH funding. This means that any scientists who want to take a stand against the mainstream narrative can lose their jobs, be blacklisted and effectively be silenced in the scientific community for good.

The concern is not only that scientists will be kept from studying the issue. Amish communities, who have been allowed religious exemptions, need to be aware that the time may come when they will be forced to vaccinate as well. Kennedy mentioned that when he was involved in creating a film about mercury in vaccines, the film crew interviewed a doctor in Lancaster who ran a huge clinic, and the doctor stated that they did not see autism in the Amish community. The CDC, Kennedy said, has declared that the difference in autism rates among the Amish compared to the rest of Americans is because "the Amish are genetically different than the rest of us." He argues that those in power will do everything they can to make the Amish vaccinate, since "it is a thorn in their side that there is a group of people in this country who are not chronically ill and who people like myself can point to them and say, 'What about the Amish?'"

The CDC's argument that the Amish are genetically different does not withstand scrutiny, he added. The cause of autism "has to be environmental. It is not genetic. It has to be an environmental toxin. Genes don't cause epidemics. They can provide a vulnerability, but you need an environmental toxin."

When Kennedy's speech ended, the audience was eager to learn more, and many attended the Q&A held in a different tent. He and Mary Holland, a lawyer and the president and general counsel of Children's Health Defense, answered a range of questions, including how to stand against the pressure of companies like Penn Medicine that are mandating COVID-19 vaccines. The choice to get the vaccine, Kennedy said, should be dependent on the individual. Each person has their own risk profile, and if someone is very old or if they have a number of comorbidities, vaccination might make sense. But, he said, "it makes zero sense for a child to get this vaccine."

At the end of the event, The Lancaster Patriot got an exclusive interview with Kennedy. He confirmed that he is fighting for double-blind studies to be conducted on vaccines in general, but he did say that the COVID-19 vaccination issue has "overwhelmed everything."

When asked what he saw as the real reason behind the intense push for people to receive the COVID-19 vaccines, he declared that it was "for money and control." He confirmed rightly so."

that even people who are in positions in the military can legally demand to have exemptions granted for a vaccine that only has an emergencyuse authorization.

When asked what ordinary people can do — those of us who can't afford lawyers to fight the changes that are occurring, but who still want to stand up for the rights and freedoms granted to all Americans in our country's founding documents he declared that we need to unify instead of remaining isolated. "We need to all push back, individually but also in groups. We're trying to help people in Pennsylvania find lawyers and to fight back and, you know, they should join Children's Health Defense." He said that Children's Health Defense has just opened a branch in Pennsylvania, and information about the branch will be added to the CHD website any day now for people who want to get involved or to seek help.

Holland also encouraged people to band together. She reminded people that judges, legislators and the other people in charge do not act in a bubble: they act in response to the broader society. When they see that a majority of the public reject the idea of medical mandates, they will feel able to stand up for the consent of the individual. Resisting medical mandates and standing up for our rights here and now is important, because once the universities and hospitals give way, the rest of the nation is next.

clear. Ezekiel begins with useless vines, fit only for burning.

What Good Is a Charred, Dead Vine?

Judah still barely survived, however. Its judgment was not complete. The northern ten tribes had been taken captive over a century earlier, and Jerusalem had capitulated to Babylon, which resulted in the "brain-drain" of early captives, capable, skilled men like Daniel then Ezekiel and his audience who were marched to Mesopotamia because they were of value to its government or economy.

Judah and Jerusalem still hung on at this time, but Israel as a whole was largely burned by God's judgment. So, Ezekiel provides a sad picture of Judah as God's vineyard—it was a charred piece of dead vine. The prophet asks his audience to consider what a dead vine, now partially charred by burning, was good for. If the vine wood had no useful purpose before and was now partially burnt in a fire, its only useful function was as a starter for yet another fire. Jerusalem was, Ezekiel made clear, like a charred piece of firewood left in a campfire to be burned later. The prophet's audience was being told by false prophets that their captivity would

be brief and that they would be going back to Judah soon (Jeremiah 29:24-32). Ezekiel was very clear; Jerusalem was itself a charred vine, headed for complete destruction in the fire of God's judgment (Ezek. 15:6).

Jerusalem was unrepentant to the day of its overthow by Babylonian forces. In one of the saddest examples of lack of repentence, the survivors of that siege and destruction fled to Egypt against Jeremiah's instruction and began offering incense to its gods. When Jeremiah rebuked them, they explicitly repudiated the prophet and condemned the worship of God as the source of all their troubles (Jer. 44:15-30).

Sin leads to judgment, never blessing. That was Jeremiah's message to the Jews. That was Ezekiel's message to the exiles in Babylon, as well, so his work was to prepare them to be part of the remnant that would return and rebuild for the Messianic reign God had promised. A generation and a half later, a remnant did return, though even at the time of Jesus there were more Jews in Mesopotamia than in Palestine. God is longsuffering, but He will not bless men in their disobedience.

The steadily growing rate of imprisonment and the massive impact imprisonment has on society form a vicious cycle that is difficult to break.

contains versions in more than 1,500 languages. PFI's Bible-based prison course and unparalleled access to prisons worldwide make it uniquely prepared for the challenge.

"This partnership takes God's Word directly into dark places, bringing hope to men and women; equipping those who have lost all hope to return to their communities and families, with light," said Jonathan Huguenin, vice president of global partnerships and language recordings at FCBH.

Evidence-Based Transformation in Prisons

Early research findings from a Baylor University study of PFI's "The Prisoner's Journey" (TPJ) course – which has already graduated more than 360,000 inmates worldwide — reveal that through increasing prisoners' religious engagement, TPJ inspires their increased motivation for identity transformation, helps them grow in virtue and gain a sense of meaning in life. These significant changes within prisoners can lead to a culture change within prison walls and beyond into the community.

By 2027, the program should operate in 1,200 prisons in 65 countries.

US SENDS ENVOY TO 'PRESS THE TALIBAN TO STOP THEIR MILITARY OFFENSIVE'

he State Department has dispatched Special Envoy Zalmay Khalilzad to Doha, the capital of Qatar, for meetings designed to respond to "the rapidly deteriorating situation in Afghanistan."

The Pentagon acknowledges that fighting between Taliban and government forces "is clearly not going in the right direction."

As provincial capitals and remote rural areas continue to fall to the Taliban, reports of abuses and the killing of civilians – including the targeted killing of journalists and others – are drawing widespread condemnation.

The U.N. children's agency UNICEF said Monday 27 children had been killed and another 136 injured in the fighting in the past 72 hours alone, most of them in Kandahar province.

"The increased tempo of Taliban military engagement, resulting civilian causalities in armed conflict between the sides, and alleged human rights atrocities are of grave concern," the State Department said in a statement announcing Khalilzad's mission.

"He will press the Taliban to

stop their military offensive and to negotiate a political settlement, which is the only path to stability and development in Afghanistan."

The jihadists escalated their offensive against the Afghan National Defense and Security Forces (ANDSF) after the withdrawal of U.S. and coalition forces began in May, seizing control of hundreds of rural districts across Afghanistan before also advancing on a number of the country's 34 provincial capitals.

Pentagon Press Secretary John Kirby confirmed during a briefing that "roughly five" provincial capitals have fallen to the Taliban in recent days. (A sixth was reported on Monday.)

He said Defense Secretary Gen. Lloyd Austin continues to believe the ANDSF "have the capacity to make a big difference on the battlefield."

The U.S. military would continue to support Afghan forces, "with airstrikes, for instance," where and when it is feasible, he said, "understanding that it's not always going to be feasible."

But as to whether that type of kinetic support would continue beyond the end-of-August target date for the completion of the withdrawal, Kirby was unclear.

President Biden has said the administration will not allow Afghanistan to be used as a springboard for terrorists to once again pose a threat to the U.S. homeland. To that end, the Pentagon says the U.S. military will retain "over-the-horizon counterterrorism capabilities" going forward.

Asked about the possibility of airstrikes in support of Afghan forces after the end of the month, however, Kirby said he had no update on "what authorities might exist after August 31," and did not want to "speculate what things are going to look like beyond that."


RESCUING CHILDREN FROM SLAVERY IN PAKISTAN: ONE ORGANIZATION'S FIGHT TO GIVE HOUSING AND HOPE TO GIRLS RESCUED FROM BONDED LABOR

n May 2019, One by One – a UK-based global missions Lorganization with a heart for the poor and broken across the Third World – opened King's Children's Home, near Lahore in Pakistan, to rehouse and give hope to children rescued from brick factory bonded labor in that country. The home opened with almost 40 children, many of whom have physical injuries due to the tough conditions they have worked in for most of their lives.

Beginning September 2021, One by One is launching a new fundraising drive, with the goal of raising \$100,000 to expand the Pakistan King's Children's Home to accommodate another 30 children.

Becky Murray, who founded One By One in 2011, explains the specific issues surrounding the brick factories of Pakistan: "There are 20,000 brick kilns in Pakistan, where adults and children are often duped into bonded labor by factory owners who give them loans. Families agree to work to pay off the debt, but bosses add high interest and living expenses - making the debts impossible to



pay off. Salaries for adults – who are forced to work at least 14 hours per day in brutal conditions – can be as low as \$5 per day."

"We have had two horrific stories of girls being raped in the last few months," said Murray. "One of them, Mercy, was just three - sadly, she died. The other girl was nine and recovered. Both these stories stirred our hearts and made us realize that we have to do more. That's why we're expanding - to give 30 more Pakistani girls hope. We will extend our home and have already lined up 30 girls who we can rescue. We will need to raise \$100,000, and then people can sponsor one of the girls for just \$30 per month."

One By One is active in many ways in Pakistan, recently launching a Sunday School outreach project in Pakistan that now reaches hundreds of children every week across 38 brick factories, spreading hope and good news.

One By One's first project was the construction and running of King's Children's Home, Bumala B, Kenya, which aims to rehouse and give hope to children that otherwise would be living in abject poverty. One By One also runs a widows' program in North Sri Lanka, working with women whose husbands were killed in the brutal civil war. In addition,

The Dignity Project – that provides teenage girls with re-usable sanitary items and education - was formed in 2016, and has now expanded to several nations including Kenya, Sierra Leone, Pakistan, South Africa and Swaziland.

Becky Murray recently released her memoir, Embrace the Journey, detailing her work with One by One, the faith lessons she learned as she built her organization, and the many miracles she's experienced...and how ALL of that was part of God's plan for

"As we go, God always provides," said Murray. "We are stepping out during the pandemic because we cannot let that stop us. Brick factory slavery in Pakistan is an injustice and many turn a blind eye to it. These heart-breaking stories motivate us to do more. I hope people can stand with us as we step out."
